WESTVIEW COMMUNITY GARDEN Abbey Henderson

The garden was started about three years ago by the former president of the Westview Community Organization, Scott Smith. Last spring, after completing an urban growers program at Truly Living Well, we started a youth garden program with about 10 children from the neighborhood. They learned how to plant, care for and harvest kale, Swiss chard, different lettuces and tomatoes. We even took a trip to Empire State South restaurant where we "sold" our harvest

and the youth learned about local food systems and how they could make a career out of farming. The head chef also cooked the harvest for us.

In the fall we made the garden communal and we've planted up the whole garden this spring with tomatoes, cucumbers, peppers, different types of melons, peas, okra, beans, kale, Swiss chard and a few other veggies. Most of those plants came from the Herman's Garden program at Seed Savers Exchange. The donation will allow the garden to grow an extensive variety of crops for the community and start a seed saving program that will provide for future years. We also have plum, apple, a fig and peach trees, and will soon plant blueberry bushes as well. We also have a chicken coop that will start operating later in the summer (need funding to finish securing it).

The food from the garden is going directly to the community for free, local businesses such as Westview Pizza Cafe and the youth will have a booth this summer at the West End Farmers Market. It's important for our neighbors that have been disenfranchised to see and learn how to grow their food...it's empowering. There are over 10 fast food restaurants in a one mile radius of the garden. This garden will provide our neighbors, especially low-income residents of color, with cheap (free) healthier options. It's an exciting year for our community!

SENIOR CITIZEN WATER **BILL DISCOUNT**

Did You Know? Senior citizens are eligible for a 30% discount on water and sewer bills. Eligibility requirements:

- You are 65 years or older. You must provide a birth certificate, driver's license or other valid Georgia ID.
- You have a maximum household income of \$25,000 or less. You must provide proof of income, such as previous or current year Federal Income Tax Form 1040 or 1099.
- You are the primary titleholder or leaseholder on the property subject to the bill. You must provide proof of residency, such as a warranty deed or lease agreement.
- You must be a City of Atlanta water and sewer customer.

If you do not receive your water and sewer bill directly from the City of Atlanta, you cannot receive the senior citizen discount.

To obtain a "Low Income Senior Citizen Discount" application via mail, contact the Department of Watershed Management Customer Service Division at 404-658-6500. Applications are also available at Fulton County Senior Citizen Facilities, Atlanta libraries, City of Atlanta recreation facilities and the Customer Service Office at 55 Trinity Avenue, 1st Floor, City Hall.

To ensure your privacy is protected we request that you submit your application and supporting documents in person to the Customer Service Office at City Hall, or to the facility where you obtained your application.

YOUTH STEM PROGRAM

Morehouse College Community Revitalization Initiative (MCCRI) is a neighborhood-based organization that seeks to engage the greater West End-Atlanta community through economic development, social action research, and community service. In 2012, MCCRI launched our Youth Entrepreneurship Club (YEC) at KIPP WAYS Academy, expanding to KIPP STRIVE Academy in 2013. We serve youth through an afterschool program that focuses on entrepreneurship, invention, and innovation. This summer, in partnership with the West End Neighborhood Development and the Westview Community Organization, we hosted our first YEC summer camp, a 4-week program in which middle school students learned basic engineering principles using LEGO building blocks. The goal of both the year-long YEC program and the LEGO summer camp is to foster students' interest in furthering their education, to encourage them to pursue STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics) fields, and to develop a culture of entrepreneurship within Atlanta's greater West End community.

On Thursday, July 10, our summer camp will culminate in a final competition in which students will compete on teams to build the best bridge out of LEGO materials. The competition will give our students an opportunity to apply the engineering design concepts they have learned throughout the summer program. It is our hope that students will learn and practice skills of innovation, planning, and design, and that they will be more comfortable engaging in the STEM fields in the future.
